### CEO REPORT

Scott Hazeldine

As I prepare this report for 2024–2025, I reflect on a year that has demanded resilience, adaptability and focus from us all. The operating environment has remained dynamic and challenging for many across our industries and within our region.



While there have been clear highlights - including renewed export growth into the China market and the continued success of major regional events such as the Barossa Vintage Festival and the Barossa Wine Auction - persistent headwinds have required us to stay informed and agile as we navigate the best path forward for Barossa and our members.

Despite these challenges, the year has seen meaningful progress. The launch of the new regional website has united our digital presence and strengthened our ability to communicate Barossa's story with one voice. The Barossa Wine School expanded its global reach, welcoming new educators and students, while the revised Barossa Super 100 Wine Classification proved highly effective in reinforcing Barossa's position in the world of fine wine.

Our regional capability has been further enhanced through a diverse program of seminars, workshops and training opportunities - from commencing another round of the Next Crop leadership course to providing support in navigating the Sustainable Winegrowing Australia program, and hands-on sessions covering topics from soft pruning to succession planning and agritourism.

Innovation also continued through the completion of the Barossa Net Zero Carbon Bottle Project and the exploration of next steps in the Barossa's old vine story.

Financially, Barossa Australia achieved a provisional operating surplus of \$27,586, with a strong balance sheet and total equity of \$2.45 million. This result reflects prudent financial management and the ability of the organisation to continue to leverage additional funds from grants and other non-levy sources.

Recent months have also seen the organisation continue to refine our strategic and operational focus, strengthen relationships with key partners, and deliver an Annual Operating Plan for the year ahead that is both fiscally responsible and clearly aligned with our priorities. This work has us well placed to continue to deliver meaningful benefit for members and proactively navigate the challenges of the current operating environment.

A dedicated and skilled team has been central to this success. My sincere thanks go to the entire Barossa Australia staff for their professionalism, energy and commitment to delivering genuine value for our members. A particular mention to Ashleigh Fox who departed Barossa Australia after thirteen years of dedicated service and valuable contribution to the organisation.

Drawing on our shared resilience and connectedness, I am confident that Barossa will continue to emerge stronger - ready to seize the opportunities ahead and ensure a vibrant, sustainable future for our region and its people.

# GRAPE GROWING





### GRAPE BAROSSA REPORT

#### **EVAN GOBELL**

In 2025, Barossa wine growers cannot remember an earlier start or finish to a vintage, with many wrapped-up before the end of March - and even later sites and varieties harvested before Easter in early April.

The Barossa Valley crush was 53,593 tonnes, 5% above the five-year average. Eden Valley yielded 6,343 tonnes, 7% below the five-year average.



For the second year in a row, Barossa did not receive soaking winter and spring rains, so drought conditions prevailed.

After a dry autumn, June and July had average rainfall but August only 50%. Spring saw 70% normal rainfall, with budburst 2–3 weeks earlier than usual and some early sites bursting in late August. Dry conditions meant clearer skies, and nighttime temperatures plummeted to below zero on 13, 17 and 18 September, causing widespread frost damage. However, many vineyards recovered and, overall, many achieved 80 to 90% of normal crops of high quality.

Overall, the 2024 calendar year received 302mm (BV) and 446mm (EV) rainfall, which was 69% of average, after the dry 2023 at 74%.

The value of the Barossa crush was \$114 million, up 8.5% on 2024. Price dispersion data showed 41% and 51% of red grapes in BV and EV respectively were purchased at \$2000 per tonne or above (similar to 2024).

#### Some highlights in 2024-25 included:

In the past 12 months, over 275 growers have participated in best practice viticulture, leadership and business skills training (co-funded) and implemented by Barossa Australia, including:

- SWA certification training with AWRI (GrowStrong and Climate Smart)
- Group and 1:1 SWA audit preparation support with VineScout and N Rudd Consulting (Climate Smart)
- Soft pruning schools with Simon&Sirch (GrowStrong and Wine Australia)
- Business skills training with University of Adelaide and Rural Business Support (GrowStrong)
- First Aid training with St John (GrowStrong)
- Mental Health First Aid Training with St John (Barossa Australia Wellbeing Fund)
- Succession planning workshop and 1:1 sessions with Halpin Wealth
- Vineyard redevelopment analysis workshop with Pinion Advisory
- Frost recovery workshop with AWRI, Colin Hinze, Barossa VitiTech Group, Adrian Hoffmann (Wine Australia).

- 80% of Barossa's 14,222 ha is under Sustainable Winegrowing Australia (SWA) membership (+15% year-on-year). Over 241 Barossa vineyards and wineries are active in SWA, with 133 third-party certified.
- Barossa's 4<sup>th</sup> "Next Crop" leadership program for young people working in Barossa grape growing kicked off with 23 participants, heading towards 90 graduates since 2012 (co-funded by Wine Australia).
- Fifteen Year 10 students participated in Barossa Australia's "Operational Viticulture" work experience week (30 students commenced school-based apprenticeships with Barossa growers in the past 5 years).

#### **GETTING GROWERS TOGETHER**

The Grape Barossa committee continued its series of "Barossa Grower Get Together and BBQ" events, with John Lienert hosting an event at his shed in Shea Oak Log. We will continue these in 2026 - and look forward to more growers joining this opportunity to connect in these challenging times.

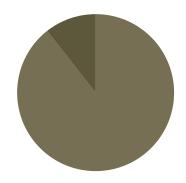
### BAROSSA AUSTRALIA 2025 VINTAGE REPORT

Barossa's 2025 winegrape crush was 59,936 tonnes. Barossa Valley at 53,593 tonnes was 7% above the 5-year average, and Eden Valley at 6,343 tonnes was 5% below.

The value of the Barossa crush was \$114 million, up 8% on 2024, and 5% below the five-year average of \$120 million.

Wine Australia's 2025 National Vintage Report revealed the Australian winegrape crush was 1.565 million, up 11% on last year. The crush value was \$1.13 billion, 14% up on 2024.

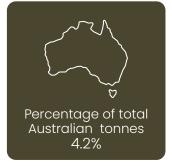

## BEST PRACTICE VITICULTURE 2024-25

#### GrowStrong and Climate Smart funding to support SWA certification

Barossa Australia was successful in securing an additional \$280,000 funding via state and federal grants <u>GrowStrong</u> and <u>National climate-smart funding</u> for Barossa grape growers (April to June 2025) to help support:

- SWA certification training with AWRI (60 growers)
- Group and 1:1 SWA audit preparation support with VineScout and N Rudd (80 growers)
- Soft pruning schools with Simon&Sirch (40 growers)
- Business skills training with University of Adelaide and Rural Business Support (21 growers)
- First Aid training with St John (15 growers)

#### Next Crop leadership program

Barossa Australia was successful in securing an additional \$55,000 from Wine Australia to co-fund Barossa's 4<sup>th</sup> "Next Crop" leadership program for young people working in Barossa grape growing. The 9-month program kicked off in May 2025 with 23 participants (90 graduates since 2012).

#### Barossa CropWatch

Barossa Australia delivered five "CropWatch" bulletins to growers on 24 July, 18 September, 21 October, 4 December and 4 February, providing vineyard management advice following spring frosts, and prevention of downy and powdery mildew. 2024/25 was Barossa Australia's 12<sup>th</sup> year providing a crop watch service to Barossa growers.

#### Vineyard redevelopment workshop

In January, 30 growers attended Barossa Australia's workshop with viticulturist/business planning specialist Colin Hinze's to look at Cost of Production and Return on Investment scenarios for changing management of vineyards (including reworking, grafting, pulling out unviable blocks).

#### Barossa Growers Frost Recovery and Management Workshop

In early October, following the spring frosts of 13, 17 and 18 September, 80 growers attended Barossa Australia's "frost recovery and management workshop" at The Barossa Cellar. This featured presentations from AWRI's Dr Mardi Longbottom and Pinion Advisory's Colin Hinze; a Barossa VitiTech Group panel session, and a field visit to Adrian Hoffmann's frost-affected Ebenezer vineyard.

#### Succession planning workshop

In August, 10 Barossa grape and wine families participated in a Succession Planning Workshop with Michael Hart of Halpin Wealth.

#### Operational Viticulture

In July, Barossa Australia hosted 15 high school students on its "operational viticulture work experience week" for Year 10s, bringing the total alumni to 73 students since 2019. Barossa growers have taken on 30 school-based apprentices since the program kicked off five years ago.

#### Barossa's 2024/25 Sustainable Winegrowing Australia report

- 241 Barossa members (up from 183 last year). Includes 202 vineyard sites and 39 winery sites.
- 133 Barossa certified members (up from 100 last year).
- 80% (11,309 Ha) of Barossa's total 14,222 Ha of vineyard area is now under Sustainable Winegrowing Australia membership (up from 9,861 Ha last year).

# WINE BAROSSA REPORT

#### **COURTNEY RIBBONS**

The Wine Barossa Committee serves as a key link between Barossa Australia and the regional wine community - representing industry interests, identifying opportunities for innovation, and advising on marketing, policy, and practice.



Early in the year, the Committee reviewed its structure to ensure focus and effectiveness, confirming three priority areas: Market Development, Capability and Innovation, and Industry, Advocacy and Sustainability.

The Committee continues to play an important advisory role, helping shape Barossa Australia's domestic and international market engagement strategy to best strengthen Barossa's position in premium global wine markets.

Committee members Matt McCulloch and Ben Chapman provided valuable guidance on export strategy, particularly in Asia and North America. Their insight, along with input from wider industry focus groups, has helped inform Barossa Australia's export initiatives - from trade shows and masterclasses to the continued development of the Barossa Super 100 Classification - ensuring Barossa remains visible and relevant in key markets.

Closer to home, the 2025 Barossa Wine Auction provided a welcome opportunity to reinforce Barossa's quality credentials in the domestic market, and its ongoing success and evolution remain key priorities.

The Committee also continues to foster collaboration across emerging areas of interest for our winemakers, including alternative packaging, no-alcohol innovation, and carbon capture. Work has begun on a program of industry site visits focused on these themes to drive shared learning.

Completion of the Barossa Net Zero Project marked a major milestone, with the Committee now considering next steps to further advance regional sustainability leadership.

Congratulations to Tim Pelquest-Hunt and the Barossa Wine Show Committee for delivering the 48th Barossa Wine Show in September 2024. With 723 entries and 419 medals, the new awards lunch format at Seppeltsfield Wines was a successful evolution of this long-standing regional celebration. The looming 50th anniversary of the Barossa Wine Show in September 2026 provides a unique opportunity to further celebrate our regional winemaking excellence.

Lastly, the Committee remains active in and around some key regional priorities. These have included advancing Barossa's "old vine" message to ensure the region's heritage and uniqueness are recognised globally as well as contributing to key advocacy discussions on strengthening export support for producers, proposed updates to container deposit schemes and the Dr Craig Emerson Independent Review of Australian Wine Policy.

Sincere thanks are extended to all Committee members for their time, expertise, and commitment and the Committee looks forward to continuing to provide a voice for the region's winemakers and working constructively to deliver added value for them in these challenging times.

### WINE KEY STATISTICS

The Barossa Australia International Market Development Strategy is a three-year strategy and plan guiding Barossa Australia's international wine market activities.

2024-2025 was the first full year post the lifting of the China tariffs. Barossa wines have flowed back into China with the value of exports increasing by 111.3% to AU\$67.4m, making China Barossa's top export market again. Although this is still well below the peak of wines exported into China in 2018-2019 of AU\$117.9.

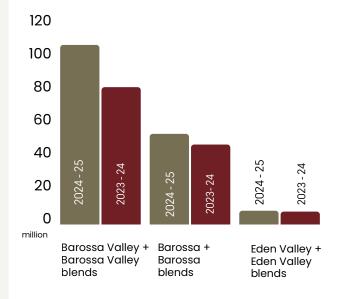
Barossa Australia continued to work with our inmarket ambassador, Anson Mui, to support the sell-through of stock in China as well as supporting diversification into other Asian markets with 16 different activations. Many of these activations were delivered in partnership with our in-market Barossa Wine School educators.

Partnering with Wine Australia and the South Australia Wine Ambassador Club has enabled us to further diversify the Barossa reach.

We also continued to explore opportunities in the USA and Canada through partnerships with GrapeFest in Texas and Knowbie in Canada.

Through the RDA BGLAP event impact calculator, the impact of these visits for the Barossa region has been calculated as providing; an additional output of \$408,000, an additional valueadd of \$210,000 and 4 additional annual jobs locally.

### BAROSSA WINE AUCTION

The 2025 Barossa Wine Auction reinforced its role as a strategic platform for showcasing the Barossa's premium and collectible wine offerings in Australia and internationally. Partnering with LANGTONS, the auction was held in two parts; in the Barossa in April linked with the Barossa Vintage Festival and in Sydney in June.

#### Key Achievements:

- 36 Barossa wineries contributed 68 total lots. Included in these lots are the four unique Barossa Collections that an additional 40 wineries also contributed to.
- 384 guests attended across the two auctions.
- From the auction net proceeds, a \$50,000 charitable donation was made to both Foundation Barossa and Barossa Vintage Festival.

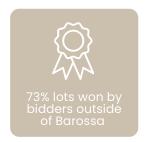

# TOURISM BAROSSA REPORT

PIPPA MERRETT (DEPUTY CHAIR)

FY24/25 marked a modest return to growth for Barossa's visitor economy. The year brought renewed momentum, deeper collaboration and a shared focus on shaping the future together.



Despite broader cost-of-living pressures, Barossa remained one of South Australia's top regional performers. South Australia Tourism Commission (SATC) data to December 2024 recorded \$287 million in visitor spend - 99% of the region's 2025 target - with 244,000 overnight visitors and 898,000 day trips.

While overnight visitation eased slightly, overall spend rose 27% on pre-Covid levels of 2019, reflecting the value placed on premium, place-based experiences. Tourism continues to support around 1,700 jobs across the Valley.

The Barossa. Be Curious campaign engaged 3.26 million Australians and was recognised with a National Bronze at the Qantas Tourism Awards whilst the Winter in Barossa seasonal campaign featured 50+ local operators, drawing 58,000+ visits to Barossa.com.

The relaunch of Barossa.com in April 2025 was a key achievement - merging four legacy sites into one dynamic platform. With 1.3 million page views annually, and 80% of listings integrated via ATDW, it now serves as a vital tool for bookings, storytelling, and trade engagement.

The Barossa Vintage Festival 2025 drew over 57,000 attendees and delivered \$16.3 million in regional impact. Committee member Michael Kruger served a dual role on both the Tourism and Festival Committees thus ensuring strong alignment and connection.

April's AFL Gather Round saw matches hosted in the new Lyndoch precinct, drawing thousands and shining a national spotlight on the region. Both events affirmed Barossa's strength as a host of major cultural and sporting experiences.

The committee was actively involved in the review of Localis visitation data, helping ensure insights reflect real-world visitor patterns and industry needs. The Committee will continue this work alongside the Barossa Australia team in the coming year to identify future regional data needs are met to help inform key strategic and business decision making in region.

Regional transport remains a concern. Improved connectivity is essential for sustainable growth, visitor experience, and community safety, and remains a priority for advocacy.

The committee has paid close attention to the SATC State Tourism Plan Review currently underway, with Geraldine Frater-Wyeth representing Barossa on the SATC Chair's Committee. As that process continues through 2026 and beyond, the committee will continue to remain engaged and advocate through the State Destination Management Plan (DMP) process, ensuring regional voices shape the next chapter.

The expanded Barossa Circle Group engaged over 200 operators across six sessions, building capability and stronger sector connection and adding to our industry engagement.

We thank outgoing Chair Lisa Anderson and members Ben Patten and Ashleigh Hogan for their contribution, and acknowledge the support of The Barossa Council, Light Regional Council, Regional Development Australia Barossa Gawler Light Adelaide Plains. and SATC.

As we look to FY25/26, our focus remains on strengthening data-informed decision-making, broadening the visitor experience, and supporting a vibrant, community-connected Barossa.

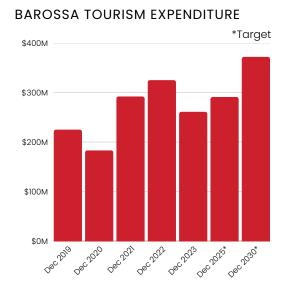

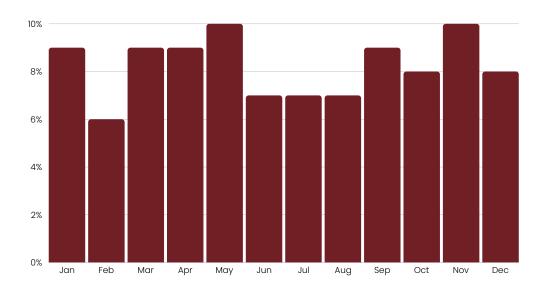

#### SEASONALITY OF DOMESTIC OVERNIGHT VISITORS TO BAROSSA 2024



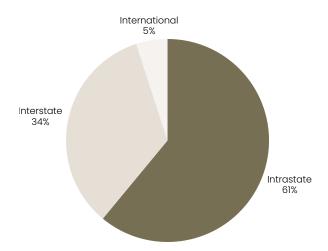

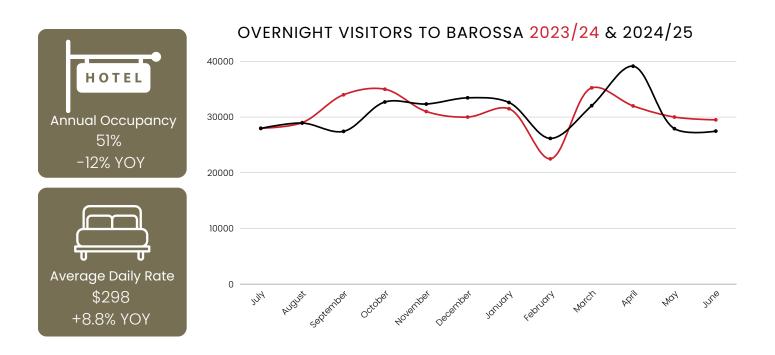

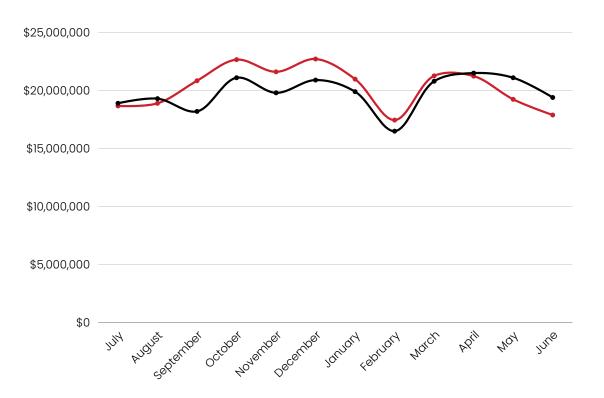
# OVERNIGHT VISITORS SOURCE MARKETS YEAR ENDING DEC 2024

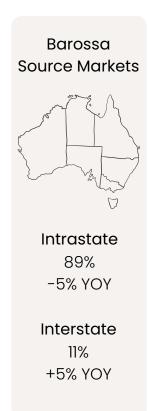

### BAROSSA VINTAGE FESTIVAL

Led by Festival Co-Directors Maz McGann and Rebecca Reynolds, the 2025 Barossa Vintage Festival reaffirmed its place as Australia's oldest and most loved wine, food and culture celebration.

Held across 19 Barossa townships, the Festival delivered 94 events, drawing 57,000 attendees and generating an economic impact of \$16.3 million - up 10 % on the previous event.

- 94 events delivered across 19 Barossa townships, showcasing the diversity of wine, food, heritage, arts and community.
- 42 community and not-for-profit organisations hosted events, supported by a strong volunteer network.
- New hallmark experiences introduced, including Touchdown Taste-Off, Club Vintage, Run Around the Vines and the Barossa Big Sing.
- Much-loved traditions returned, including the Grand Parade, Grape-Stomping and Party at the Oval.
- The first 'Friends of the Festival' initiative established, creating a sustainable funding and engagement model.
- 4.35 million media reach achieved through integrated marketing, paid digital, influencer content, radio, print and TV coverage.
- Website users increased to 62 000, with audiences spanning Adelaide, Melbourne and Sydney.
- Festival messaging centred on "Celebrating the Vintage Your Place, Your Party" and "Australia's Oldest and Best Wine, Food and Culture Festival."
- 95 % of stakeholders indicated they are likely to participate in future festivals.

Plans are already underway for the next chapter in 2027, building on the momentum of this year's success. The Festival's collaborative spirit, strong community foundations and creative leadership continue to shape an event that's proudly Barossan, rooted in tradition, yet always evolving.

With local organisations, volunteers and supporters behind it, the Barossa Vintage Festival is not just a celebration of vintage, but a shared story that grows richer with each passing year.

#### Member Engagement and Industry Support

Barossa Australia's communications and engagement activities continued to inform, connect and support members across grape, wine and tourism sectors.

- 48 Member EDMs sent to 1 293 recipients (average open rate 49.2%).
- Member Facebook followers 1 078 (reach 3 000); LinkedIn followers 2 608 (impressions 15 381).
- Four Barossa Circle networking sessions and two capability workshops delivered, engaging around 200 participants across the year.
- Gather Round event readiness workshop attended by ~80 participants.
- Localis visitation and spend data used to inform member, Board and stakeholder planning.
- 152 responses received for the Annual Member Survey, informing the FY26 Annual Operating Plan.
- 74 brands nominated for the Barossa Super 100 Classification II; 57 qualified, 127 wines (refer to International Market Development page 27).

#### Trade and Market Development (summary)

Barossa's international and domestic trade presence continued to grow through coordinated activity and collaboration with key partners.

- Representation at Grapefest Texas 2024 and the Asia Program (16 activations, 976 attendees).
- Three international buying groups (Finland, Canada, US/UK) and two Asia delegations hosted in partnership with Wine Australia and the South Australian Wine Ambassadors Club.
- Tastings hosted for six wine writers and five media visits, generating national and international coverage.
- Representation at Australian Tourism Exchange (ATE) 2025 90 trade appointments and International Media Marketplace 23 media appointments.
- Visit Barossa consumer newsletter launched, distributed to 6 756 subscribers (average open rate 30.3%).
- 25 000 Barossa Touring Maps reprinted to meet visitor demand.
- 25 percent increase in events hosted at The Barossa Cellar.

#### Global Partnerships and Representation

Barossa Australia continues to strengthen its global networks and share regional expertise through key alliances and programs.

- Ongoing participation in the Wine Origins Alliance and Great Wine Capitals Network.
- Great Wine Capitals Bursary awarded for research into luxury wine tourism and direct-to-consumer sales.
- Support for SATC and ATEC initiatives, including Explore SA / Destination Showcase (FY26 hosting) and the ATEC Tourism Trade Ready Program.

#### Digital and Marketing Platforms

A strong focus on digital transformation and coordinated marketing improved Barossa's reach and visibility.

- New Barossa.com launched (April 2025), consolidating four legacy sites and recording 215,000 visitors and 1.3 million page views in FY24/25.
- Around 80 percent of content powered by ATDW plugin, enhancing member visibility and referrals.
- Combined social media reach: Facebook 903 000; Instagram 128 000 (MyBarossa + BarossaWines).
- Barossa Visitor Guide re-issued.
- Barossa Super 100 Classification II collateral produced (posters, flyers, stickers, media wall, web and social content).
- Winter in Barossa campaign delivered across paid and organic channels featuring seasonal member experiences.
- Santos Tour Down Under, AFL Gather Round and Barossa Vintage Festival amplified through digital promotion (50 + events featured).
- Transition to Zoho One completed, integrating CRM, communications and project management systems.

#### Signature Events and Campaigns

Barossa's signature and collaborative events continued to showcase the region's people, produce and experiences.

- Barossa Wine Show 2024: 723 entries (39 Wines of Provenance class); 230 guests at awards lunch.
- Barossa Vintage Festival 2025: 94 events delivered; influencer hosting generated 150 000 impressions in 36 hours; livestream to China via SATC Weibo.
- Barossa Wine Auction 2025: two events (Barossa and Sydney); 384 guests;
   68 lots sold; national media coverage including Gourmet Traveller.
- Winter in Barossa 2025 campaign (Jun 2025 Sept 2025) was a dedicated winter visitation campaign, generating 1.2+ million social impressions and 57,000 website visitors. Three EDMs achieved up to 36% open rates, and influencer visits produced 48+ posts and reels reaching 630,000 viewers with an estimated \$12.6K in earned media value.

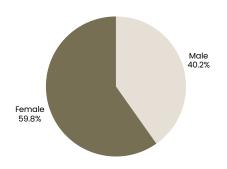

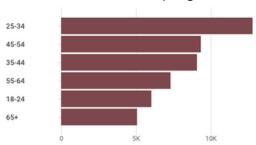
